Our speaker this month is Dr. Scott Hawley. Dr. Hawley joined the Belmont faculty in the fall of 2006. He was previously a postdoctoral researcher in the field of numerical relativity, a discipline combining elements of computational physics, nonlinear wave mechanics, astrophysics and gravitation theory. He has also recently finished mixing his second studio album as a singer-songwriter. Dr. Hawley enjoys combining his enthusiasm for physics and music by teaching at Belmont, particularly in teaching physics classes for Audio Engineering Technology students.

Dr. Hawley received a B.S. in Physics from the College of William and Mary and a Ph.D. in Physics from the University of Texas at Austin. Don't miss his January program for BSAS when he will be speaking on the topic of Gravity and Black Holes.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY LESLIE PELTIER

This month we celebrate the life of an amateur astronomer without parallel. Leslie C. Peltier was born January 2, 1900 on the family farm outside of Delphos, Ohio. When Leslie was five years old, his mother pointed out the Pleiades to the young child, and his love of the night sky began. With the help of library books, Leslie soon knew his way around the sky. While a teenager, Leslie picked 900 quarts strawberries on his father's farm to earn the \$18 necessary to purchase a 2 inch refractor.

Although Leslie dropped out of high school to work on the farm, his interest in astronomy never waned. One of his first official associations began at the age of 18, when he joined the American Association of Variable Star Observers (AAVSO). Through that organization, Leslie was able to borrow a 4 inch refractor, which he placed on a pedestal in the farm's cow pasture. Later, his father built a housing for the telescope, which became the Peltier Observatory (although it wouldn't be the only observatory so named). Until his death, Peltier never missed sending in a monthly report to the AAVSO.

In 1921, with the aid of a loaner telescope from Princeton University, Peltier began comet hunting. It was four years before his efforts paid off. On November 13, 1925, Peltier found his first comet. Over his lifetime, Peltier would discover a total of 11 comets, as well as two novae.

In 1933, Peltier married Dorothy Nihiser. After living with Leslie's uncle for a while, they settled into their own home in Delphos. At this time, Leslie was working as a designer at the Delphos Bending Company. In 1937, the skills learned on the job allowed him to build his truly "revolutionary" observatory: The Merry-Go-Round Observatory. Rather than just a dome that rotates to follow the sky, the entire building rotated! Peltier like it so well that when he and Dorothy moved to a new home, they took the observatory with them.

In 1959, the Peltier's son, Stanley, was attending Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. While there, Stanley learned that the school was going to tear down its observatory. After some persuasion, the school was convince to transfer the observatory and its 12 inch refractor to the custody of Leslie Peltier. After arriving at his home, in several parts, Peltier was able to get help in the assembly from a local construction crew and their crane. For the next 20 years, the observatory would host innumerable school children and community members for public observations.

Despite his lack of education, Peltier's reputation as an astronomer won him recognition and many honors, including: an honorary high school diploma from Delphos Jefferson High School; an honorary doctorate from Bowling Green State University; the mountain that houses Ford Observatory renamed Mt. Peltier; Harlow Shapley dubbing Peltier the "world's greatest nonprofessional astronomer;" and an appearance on To Tell The Truth. Peltier also wrote three books: "Starlight Nights: Adventure of a Stargazer" (for which he won the Ohio Author of the Year Award in 1966), "The Place on Jennings Creek", and "Guidepost to the Stars: Exploring the Sky with Binoculars."

On May 10, 1980, Leslie Peltier died of a heart attack. To honor his life, the town of Delphos placed a memorial sundial on the grounds of the public library, where Peltier had served on the Board for over 30 years. Also, the Astronomical League created the Leslie C. Peltier Award to honor amateurs who make contributions of lasting significance to astronomy. Peltier is recognized as a great among amateur astronomers, but he had a self-deprecating sense of humor about what he did, once saying, "I feel it is my duty to warn others...that they approach the observing of variable stars with the utmost caution. It is easy to become an addict, and as usual, the longer the indulgence is continued the more difficult it becomes to make a clean break and go back to a normal life." The world of astronomy is a better place due to Peltier failing to make a "clean break." All astronomers, amateur and professional, have much to learn from this month's honoree: Leslie Peltier.


Barnard-Seyfert Astronomical Society Minutes of a Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors Held On Thursday, December 7, 2006

The board of directors of the Barnard-Seyfert Astronomical Society met in regular session at the Cumberland Valley Girl Scout Council Building in Nashville, Tennessee on December 7, 2006. A sign-in sheet was circulated in lieu of a roll call. Board members Tony Campbell, Keith Burneson, Bill Griswold, Bob Rice, and Randy Smith were present. Board members Mike Benson, JanaRuth Ford, Kris McCall, Mark Manner, Pam Thomas, and Gary Wilkerson were absent. Also attending were BSAS members Terry Reeves and Steve Wheeler. Since a quorum was not present, Vice-President Keith Burneson called the meeting to order at 7:47 P.M for only a brief discussion of business that would require no voting.

Treasurer Randy Smith reported that the Society's bank balance was \$3,789.77. Bill Griswold reported that Pam Thomas was the new editor of the BSAS' *Eclipse* newsletter. Keith Burneson reminded the group to bring books and other items for the silent auction to be held at the annual holiday supper on December 21st. Mr. Burneson noted that he would contact the TAG Camp management, where the 2007 Tennessee Star Party (TNSP) will be held, to determine exactly when cabins would be considered to be "opened" and thereby incurring a rental charge. Bill Griswold suggested that he also seek a remedy for the glaring spotlight that was a nuisance at the last TNSP. Mr. Griswold asked the group if they favored continuing to have board meetings at the Girl Scout Council Building and all indicated that they did.

Since there was no further business to discuss, Vice-President Burneson declared the meeting adjourned at 8:09 P.M.
